# State law chart: Shield laws (updated July 15, 2024)

In the aftermath of the U.S. Supreme Court decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, abortion has been severely restricted or banned in approximately half the states. These laws have far-reaching implications and raise concerns among physicians about criminal prosecution, civil litigation, and/or professional disciplinary action across state lines. In response to concerns that abortion bans could be enforced by restrictive states extraterritorially, some states have enacted so-called "shield laws" to protect healthcare professionals who provide abortion care from out-of-state civil, criminal, professional and other forms of liability. These laws do not preclude action in another state but limit the impact or reach of out-of-state actions in the protective state.

The chart below tracks state legislation to shield abortion providers from out-of-state actions, investigations, and proceedings. **Importantly, protections are limited to reproductive health-related activity and are conditional on the underlying action (e.g., providing abortion care) being provided lawfully in the protective state.** Some states also extend protections to providers of gender-affirming care. Additionally, several governors have issued executive orders that are not included in this chart.
